Proposed Ordinance No. 93-54

(Off-Road Vehicles)

Ordinance No. 93-54, prepared for Council consideration, was intended to (1) establish a legal route that would enable snowmobile operators to traverse north or south through the City to access rural trails and (2) enable snowmobile riders to access restaurants and gas stations adjacent to the Parks Highway within the City.

In order to meet the above two objectives it is necessary to legally operate the machines on a very limited portion of bike paths and sidewalks. The City attorney advises that the City cannot permit operation of the machines on the bike path or sidewalks unless those areas are designated for <u>exclusive</u> use by the snowmobilers and that the City, in any event, could not authorize the desired use on the State bike path adjacent to the Parks Highway.

Administration does not support proposals to permit snowmobile operation on City streets. In view of the above, Administration recommends postponing the proposed Ordinance No. 93-54 until further study and/or revisions can be completed.

ORDINANCE SERIAL NO. <u>93-54</u>

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WASILLA, ALASKA REPEALING AND REENACTING CHAPTER 14.17 OF THE WASILLA MUNICIPAL CODE, OFF ROAD VEHICLES.

BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED BY THE CITY OF WASILLA, ALASKA AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION I.</u> <u>Classification.</u> This is a code ordinance.

<u>SECTION II.</u> <u>Purpose.</u> To repeal Chapter 14.17 of the Wasilla Municipal Code in its entirety and reenact Chapter 14.17 as follows:

14.17.010 <u>Definitions</u>. For the purposes of this chapter the following terms are defined as follows:

- A. Off-road vehicle: Any motorized vehicle not authorized or licensed for travel or operation on the traveled portion of a street, road or highway by the State of Alaska or the Wasilla Municipal Code.
- B. Traveled portion of street, road or highway means that portion of the roadway maintained for and intended for use by vehicles licensed by the State of Alaska.
- C. Wheeled off-road vehicles: Any motorized vehicle that uses wheels or tires as primary contact with the surface and is not licensed by the State of Alaska to operate on public roads.
- D. Snowmachine: Any motorized vehicle that uses a continuous track for propulsion and skis for steering and is not licensed by the State of Alaska to operate on public roads.
- E. Public Right-of-Way: Publicly owned or publicly dedicated real property, other than the traveled portions of streets, roads and highways on which off-road vehicles may lawfully travel or operate.

14.17.015 Off Road Vehicle: General

- A. <u>Protective Clothing</u> Any person operating or riding on an off-road vehicle shall wear a protective helmet.
- B. <u>Time of Operation:</u> No off-road vehicle shall be operated in the City of Wasilla after 10:00 p.m. Sunday through Thursday or after 11:30 p.m. on Friday or Saturday or prior to 7:00 a.m. on any day..
- C. <u>Speed Limits</u>: The following maximum speed limits shall apply to the operation of off-road vehicles unless the operator is a police officer in the performance of his duty.
 - a. 30 mph on any public right-of-way.

- b. 40 mph on any lake or waterway unless participating in a racing event conducted under a permit issued by the City of Wasilla.
- c. 10 mph on a bicycle or pedestrian pathway, subject to the limitations of WMC 14.17.020.
- d. 5 mph on sidewalks and parking lot, subject to the limitations of WMC 14.17.020.
- e. Mufflers: No off-road vehicle may be operated in the City of Wasilla unless it is equipped with a fully operational muffler or noise suppression equipment of original or equal effectiveness.
- f. No off-road vehicle may be operated from one-half hour before sunset to on-half hour after sunrise unless all original or equal lighting systems are operational.
- g. No off-road vehicle shall be operated when occupied or carrying more passengers, including the operator, than recommended by the manufacturer of the vehicle.
- h. Off-road vehicles shall not be operated on any portion of the public right-of-way when such right-of-way is signed or visually marked to indicate that off-road vehicles are prohibited.

14.17.020 Wheeled Off-Road Vehicles.

Operation of wheeled off-road vehicles on the traveled portion of any street, road or highway, or on any pedestrian walkway, sidewalk or bike path is prohibited except that crossing of streets, roads, highways, sidewalks or bike paths may be made at 90 degree angles, and only if such crossing can be safely accomplished without interruption or interference with the lawful users of the streets, roads, highways, sidewalks or bike paths.

14.17.030. Snowmachines.

A snowmachine may not be operated in the City of Wasilla unless it has a current State of Alaska registration and may not be operated on any pedestrian walkway, sidewalk or bike path unless the pedestrian walkway, sidewalk or bike path is specifically signed by the City of Wasilla as a designated snowmachine route, except that crossings of streets, roads, highways, sidewalks or bike paths may be made at 90 degree angles, and only if such crossing can be safely accomplished without interruption or interference with the lawful users of the streets, roads, sidewalks or bike paths.

14.17.040. Penalties

Notwithstanding the provisions of WMC 1.24, General Penalties, a person found by a law enforcement flicer to have committed a violation of the provisions of this chapter may, at the discretion of the officer, be permitted to voluntarily place the off-road vehicle involved in the violation into temporary storage at the City storage yard. The length of temporary storage shall be a minimum of two weeks and a maximum of three months as determined by the officer. Persons electing to immediately place the vehicle into temporary storage as determined by the officer shall not be issued another police

Subject: Winter Recreational Development

The Mat-Su Motor Mushers, the local snowmachine organization, has asked for a meeting to discuss safety and regulations that will allow recreational use of snowmachines in the City.

he Municipality of Anchorage has made their city virtually unavailable for use by snowmachines and with the exception of Valdez and many innovative cities in the lower 48, the machines are not welcome in cities. However, it is possible to create an enormous amount of winter economic activity from snowmachine enthusiasts. With the assistance of local snowmachine associations in educating machine users and marking trails, along with local law enforcement of regulations, a safe and profitable seasonal industry can be developed. Wasilla can be a hub of winter activity because existing trails lead from Wasilla to many day-ride destinations.

The attached draft regulation has been developed as a basis for allowing regulated use of ORV's in the City of Wasilla. Your comments on the concept and on the draft ordinance will be appreciated. If feasible, we would like to present this program to Council in October.

<u>Dale Sutter</u>, Safety Commander of Mat-Su Mushers, stated that there are plans to go into the schools in this area to help educate the students on snowmachine safety. He also thinks Ordinance Serial No. 93-DRAFT is workable with some minor changes.

Linda Smith, Alaska State Snowmobile Association, said this organization is now in the process of educating the students on snowmachine safety. They are also organizing supervised races for the young snowmobilers and stressing safety. They are also encouraging participation in the club as members.



As a 20 year resident of Wasilla and a local land and homeowner, I would like to comment on the proposed snowmachine ordinance.

Snowmachine sales and recreational use has risen drasticly in recent years. Before this boom snowmachine usage was at low enough levels where conflicts between snowmachiners and pedestrians, snowmachiners and landowners, snowmachiners and wildlife were at acceptable levels. Now, the problem is that there are far too many snowmachines on local They are loud, spew noxious 2-cycle exhaust, and often have no respect for private property or the rights of other recreationists to enjoy fresh air and solitude. What's worse, they are practically everywhere. Turning Wasilla into a "Motorhead Mecca" can only make problems worse.

In the interest of public safety and the continued quality of life in the valley please do not pass this proposed ordinance.
